RIDE INTO THE YEAR OF THE HORSE AT THE ASIAN ART MUSEUM

Lunar New Year festivities include music, lion-dance performances, storytelling, art activities, for Year of the Horse

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 7, 2014—The Asian Art Museum will kick festivities into high gear throughout

January and February to celebrate the Lunar New Year and welcome the Year of the Horse. Beginning in January, the Asian Art Museum will offer exciting opportunities for children to learn about the traditions of this important holiday through captivating storytelling, fun gallery activities and creative art-making. On Feb. 2, the museum will host the Lunar New Year Celebration featuring juggling and acrobatic performances by Red Panda Acrobats and more.
