FLOCK TO THE ASIAN ART MUSEUM TO CELEBRATE YEAR OF THE RAM

Asian Art Museum welcomes Lunar New Year with lion dance, musical performances, art activities

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 6, 2015— Bay Area residents and visitors of all ages are

invited to welcome the Year of the Ram at the Asian Art Museum's annual Lunar New Year celebration on Sunday, Feb. 8. Festivities include traditional and modern music performances, as well as dances presented by students from the Chinese American International School, and China Dance School and Theatre. Students will also perform a playful version of the lion dance, which is believed to scare away evil spirits and ensure a bright beginning to the year. In the afternoon students from West Portal Elementary School's Chinese Performing Arts Program will teach visitors how to walk on stilts, dance with ribbons and do martial arts. To round out the day's activities, children's book author Oliver Chin will read stories about Chinese zodiac animals and their characteristics. The exact date of the Lunar New Year changes each year according to the lunar and solar calendar, ensuring that it can remain in January or February. In 2015, Lunar New Year (also known as Chinese New Year) takes place on Thursday, Feb. 19.
