1. Call to Order.						

Chair Akiko Yamazaki called the meeting to order at 4:05 p.m., a quorum being present.

2. Approval of Minutes

Minutes from the September 29, 2015 meeting were approved as written.

3. Chair's Report

Akiko Yamazaki thanked everyone for coming together for a full board meeting so shortly on the heels of the September 29 annual meeting, noting the purpose was to request board approval on the transformation project plan. She celebrated other transformations already happening at the museum under Jay Xu's leadership and the staff's hard work that included strengthened staff and exhibitions. Akiko called on Jeffrey Durham, Assistant Curator of Himalayan Art, who presented the Art Hit: *Hidden Gold*.

4. Transformation Project Committee Report

Director Jay Xu gave a brief review of what had previously been presented on the transformation project, based on objectives from the museum's long-range business plan, and he called upon Kulapat Yantrasast of wHY Architecture who reviewed the proposed design concept. Transformation Project Committee (TPC) Chair, Tim Kahn, thanked Messrs. Xu and Yantrasast for their concise review and presentation, and before going over the recommendation of the TPC for approval by the board, he thanked the members of the TPC for their dedication and hard work: Bob Duffy, Virginia Foo, Nanci Nishimura, Leslie Tang Schilling and Nick Unkovic. In closing, Mr. Kahn introduced the TPC's proposed recommendation for approval by the Foundation (and acknowledgement of Foundation approval by the Commission) to be voted on later in the meeting.

5. Consideration and Possible Action Items

a. Acknowledgement of Asian Art Museum Foundation's Approval of Asian Art Museum Transformation Project Plan

WHEREAS, The museum's long-range Business Plan adopted on September 24, 2013 called for (i) enhancing special exhibition spaces and capabilities, (ii) transforming the collection galleries, (iii) building staff, capabilities and programs, and (iv) growing the endowment; and

WHEREAS, In September of 2014, the Asian Art Museum Foundation (Foundation) established two ad hoc committees: Transformation Project Committee (TPC) to oversee the work of the museum staff in the process of designing and implementing the transformation, and the Campaign Executive Committee (CEC) to oversee the work of the staff in implementing a capital campaign; and

WHEREAS, Over the past year, the TPC has explored how to best fulfill the goals of the Business Plan through changes to the facility, and the CEC has successfully secured over \$42 million in campaign cash and pledges; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, The Asian Art Commission hereby acknowledges the Foundation's approval of:

- the Transformation Project concept featuring a new exhibition pavilion and targeted enhancements throughout the galleries, education classrooms, and public spaces; and
- a comprehensive Capital Campaign goal of \$125 million: \$25 million for Transformation Project, \$27 million for Bridge Fund, \$73 million for Endowment; and
- the Transformation Project budget of \$25 million, with the understanding that TPC will seek additional board authorization before the start of major construction.

b. Approval of Loan No.: OL2015.6 to the National Palace Museum Southern Branch, Taibao City, Taiwan

WHEREAS, The National Palace Museum Southern Branch, Taibao City, Chiayi County, Taiwan (NPMSB), requests a loan of 171 objects from the Asian Art Museum (AAM) for an exhibition (title to be determined) to be held from approximately December 2017 through March 2018; and

WHEREAS, This loan request is in exchange for the National Palace Museum, Taipei, Taiwan (NPM) loan of 180 objects to the AAM for the exhibition *Emperors' Treasures: Chinese Art from the National Palace Museum, Taipei*; and

WHEREAS, A detailed list of the objects from the collection is attached, with further information available upon request from AAM's registration office; and

WHEREAS, The Director signed a Memorandum of Understanding on March 31, 2014 in regards to this loan with the NPM; and

WHEREAS, The Director and the Deputy Director, Art and Programs recommend approval of the loan to the NPMSB with possible additional venues to be identified and subject to separate approval by the Asian Art Commission; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Asian Art Commission approves Loan No. OL2015.6 to the NPMSB, and authorizes and directs the Director, working with staff, to negotiate and execute a loan agreement with terms satisfactory to the AAM.
